"The Máistir Gairmiúil san Oideachas is a two-year postgraduate course, where one qualifies to become a post-primary school teacher. The best thing about the course is that everything is done through Irish. There is an emphasis on Irish language education and school placement is done in schools that teach through Irish. There is a focus on technology and on the creation of materials. Because of the small classes and the cooperative, pleasant atmosphere, I always felt there was support for me on this course. There is undoubtedly a huge demand for teachers who can teach through Irish and even though I didn't get my education through Irish this course definitely gave me the confidence to work in this sector."

Colm Ó Coileáin: Science, Physics/Chemistry Teacher in Pobalscoil Chorca Dhuibhne. Chemistry Teacher for E-Hub

“I love teaching Science and Physics through Irish in Pobalscoil Chorca Dhuibhne, County Kerry. I speak Irish and I’m passionate about science so it makes sense for me to teach Science through Irish. There are many more opportunities for science teachers if they can teach through Irish. I love motivating young people in science and there is a great variety in the work – no two classes are the same!

The best thing about teaching physics is the critical thinking it instils in the students and, in a way, teaching through Irish contributes to that kind of thinking too. The terminology in science can be difficult but often the Irish term explains the concept better than the English term.

I also love being able to teach Chemistry on the E-Hub – to Chemistry students from all over the Gaeltacht – in Gaeltachtaí Dobhair and Conamara. While teaching online has certain disadvantages, the E-Hub give students a chance to study these subjects through Irish when they’re not available in their own schools.

I would definitely recommend this profession to anyone who has an interest in science or Irish. Teachers have a great life!”
